1. Apple

A classic beginner subject — perfect for learning basic shapes and shading

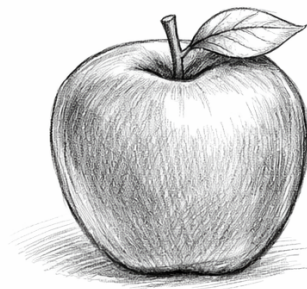

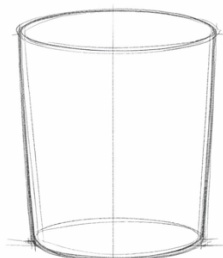
Quick Tips:

- Start with a light oval — don't press too hard
- Add the stem and leaf before committing to final lines
- Use circular strokes for shading to follow the form
- Leave a small highlight to suggest light source

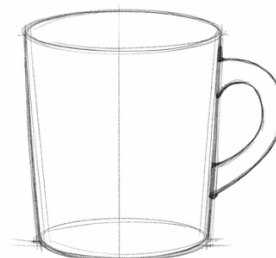
2. Coffee Mug

Great for understanding cylinders and perspective

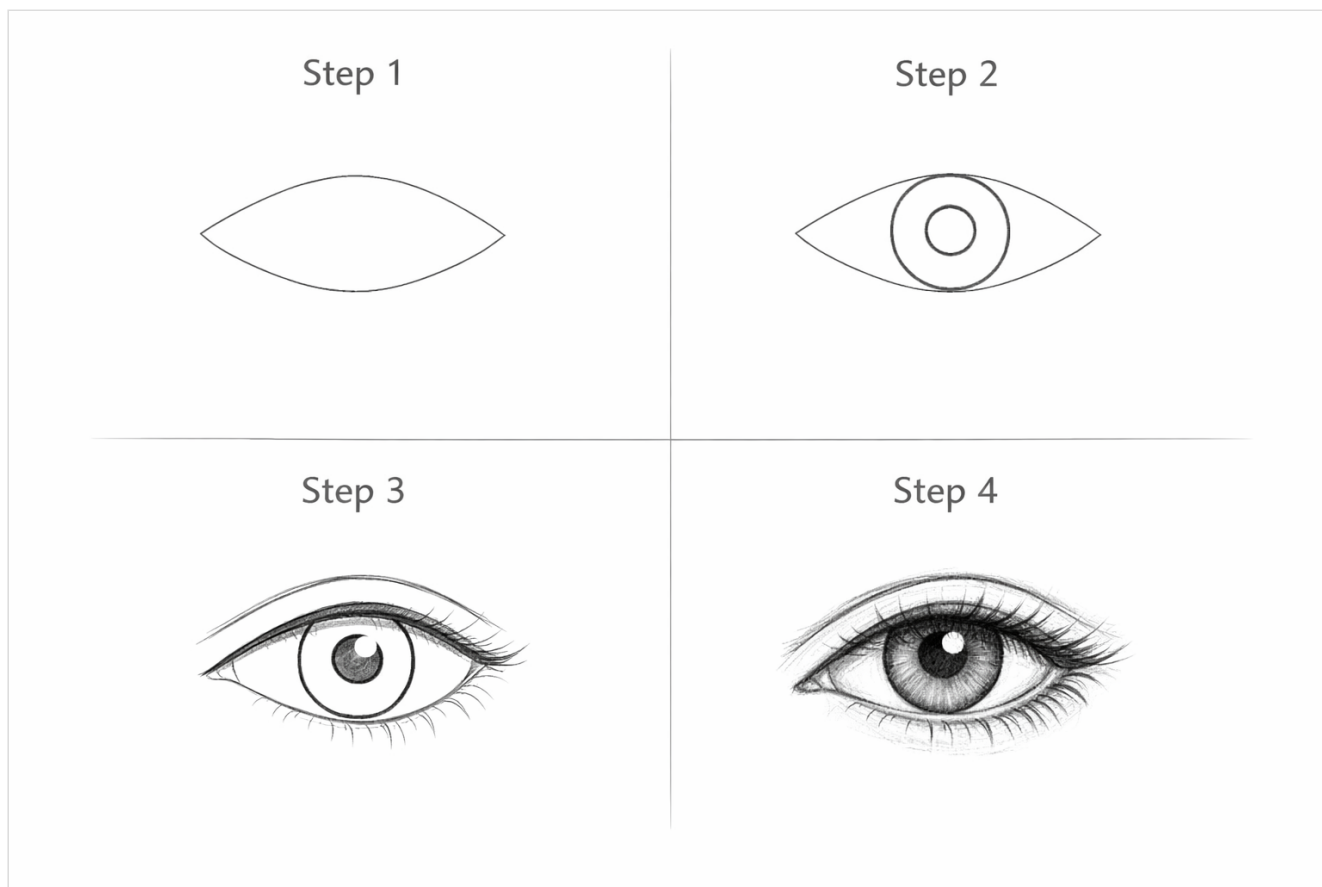


Quick Tips:

- The rim of the mug is an ellipse, not a circle
- Keep the handle proportions in mind — it should look balanced
- Use smooth, curved lines for the handle
- Shade the inside of the mug darker than the outside

3. Human Eye

An intermediate challenge — introduces organic curves and detail



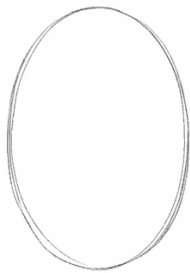
Quick Tips:

- The eye is not a perfect circle — it's more of an almond shape
- The iris is a perfect circle, even when the eye is looking sideways
- Add the eyelid crease above the upper lash line
- Highlight on the pupil brings the eye to life

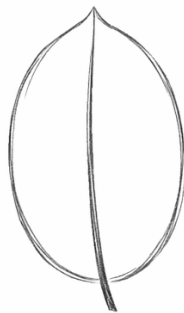
4. Leaf

Simple subject for practicing organic shapes and vein patterns

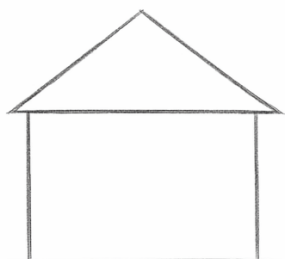
Quick Tips:

- Start with the basic oval shape before adding details
- The center vein should be the most prominent line
- Side veins should branch at natural angles
- Use light shading to give the leaf volume

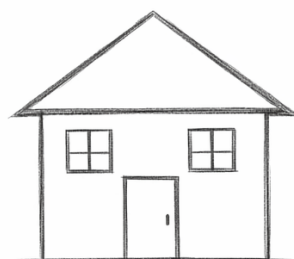
5. House

Perfect for learning basic geometric shapes and architectural details

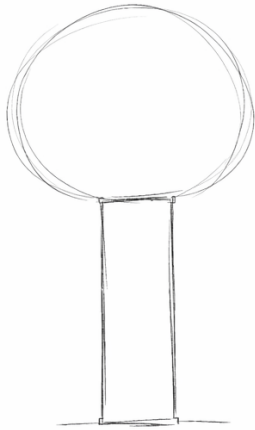
Quick Tips:

- Keep walls perfectly vertical and horizontal
- The roof triangle should be proportional to the walls
- Add details like windows and doors before shading
- Use hatching for wall texture and depth

6. Tree

Learn to combine simple shapes into organic forms

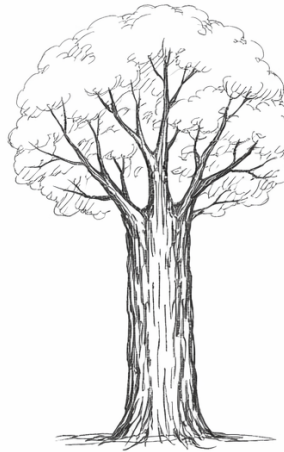

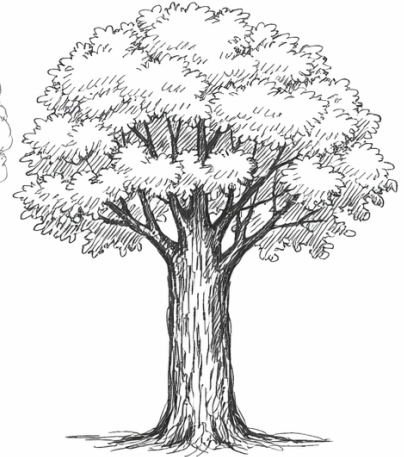

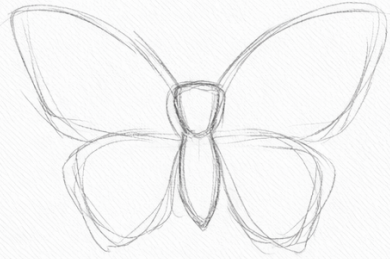


Quick Tips:

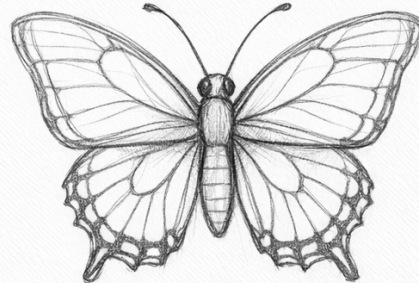
- Start with a rectangle for the trunk and circle for canopy
- Add branches before filling in leaves
- Use clustered, irregular shapes for the canopy
- Vertical lines work well for bark texture

7. Butterfly

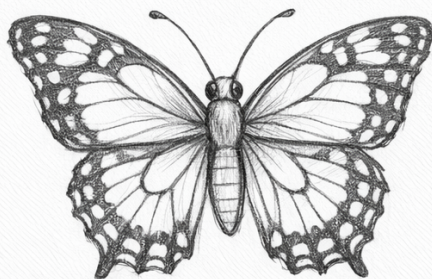
Great for practicing symmetry and decorative patterns

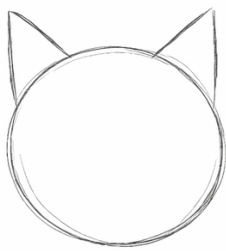

Quick Tips:

- Draw the body first as a guide for symmetry
- Keep wing shapes balanced on both sides
- Start with large patterns, then add smaller details
- Use light shading to give wings dimension

8. Cat Face

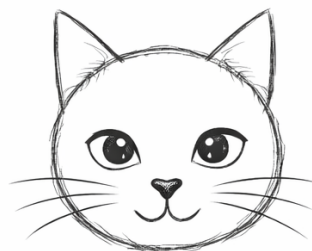
Fun animal portrait — introduces fur texture and facial features



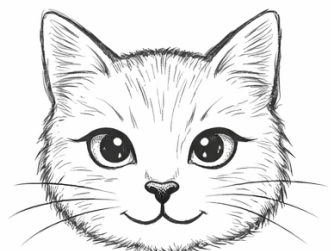

Quick Tips:

- Start with a circle for the head — cats have round faces
- Place the eyes wide apart for a natural look
- Use short, directional strokes for fur texture
- Whiskers should be thin and slightly curved

9. Sneaker

Modern object sketch — great for practicing perspective and detail

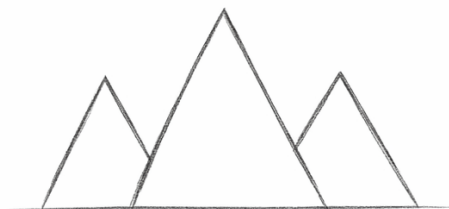
Quick Tips:

- Sketch the overall silhouette first
- Pay attention to the sole thickness and curve
- Laces should cross at even intervals
- Use cross-hatching for fabric texture

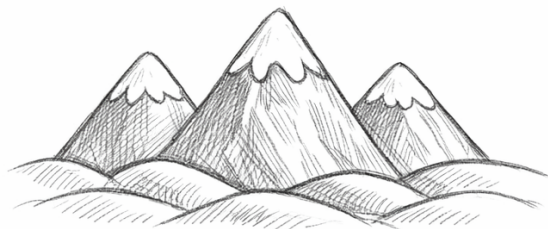
10. Mountain Landscape

Introduces composition, depth, and atmospheric perspective

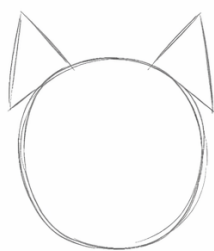


Quick Tips:

- Start with large triangular shapes for mountains
- Nearer mountains should be darker and more detailed
- Add foreground elements for depth and scale
- Use lighter lines for distant elements

11. Dog Face

Another great animal portrait — practice fur texture and expression

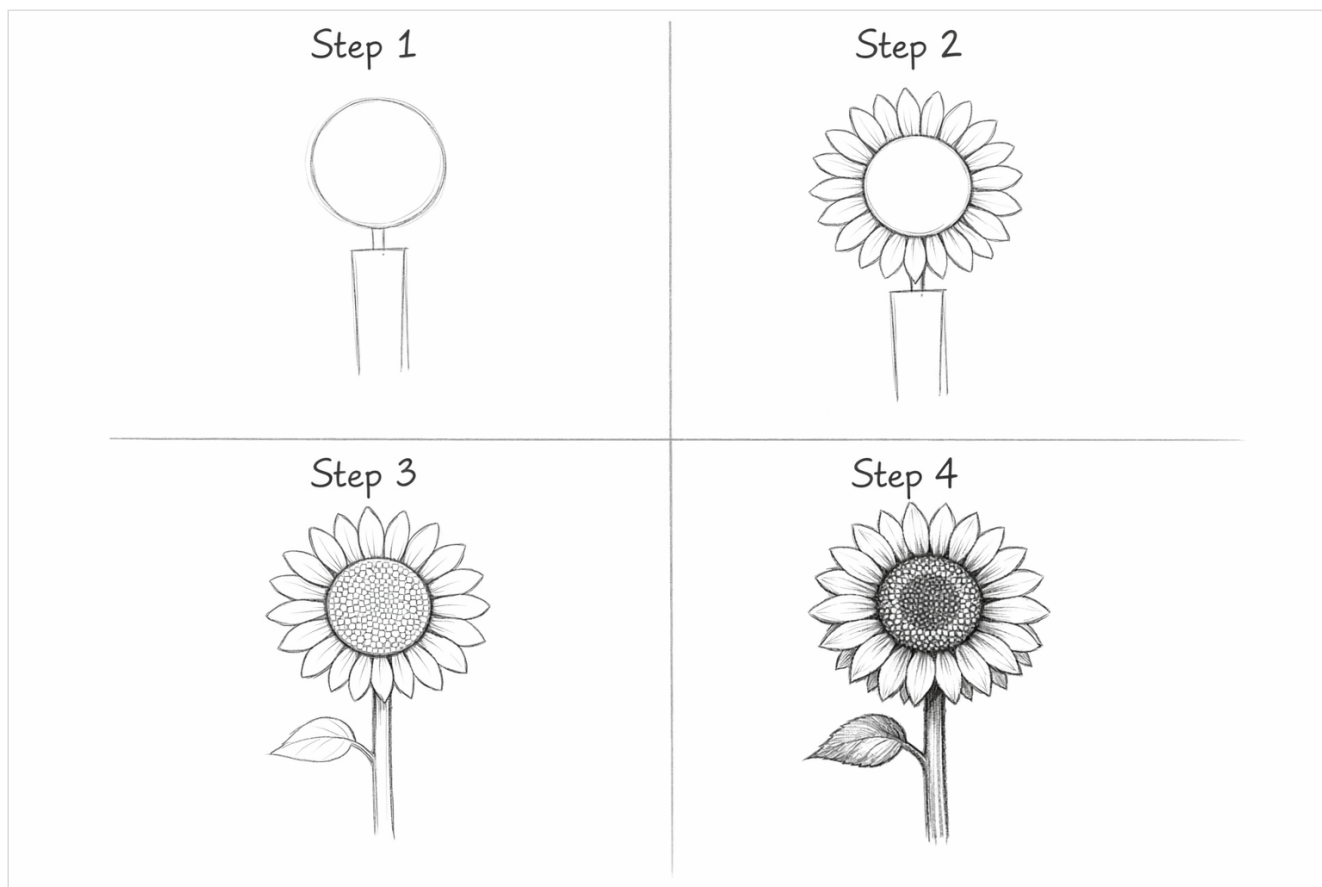

Quick Tips:

- The snout should be proportionate to the head
- Place the eyes slightly above the center of the head
- Use longer strokes for fur on the ears
- A small highlight in the eyes adds life

12. Sunflower

Beautiful flower subject — practice radial patterns and texture



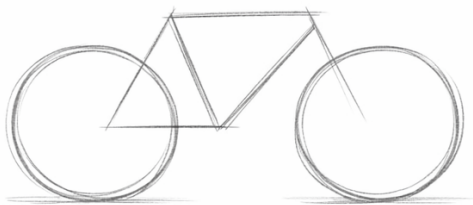
Quick Tips:

- Draw a perfect circle for the center first
- Petals should radiate evenly around the center
- Use small dots or circles for the seed pattern
- Overlapping petals create a more natural look

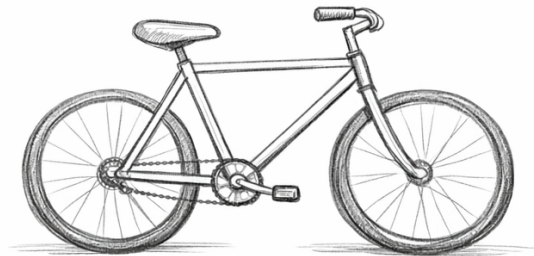
13. Bicycle

Mechanical subject — great for learning structure and detail

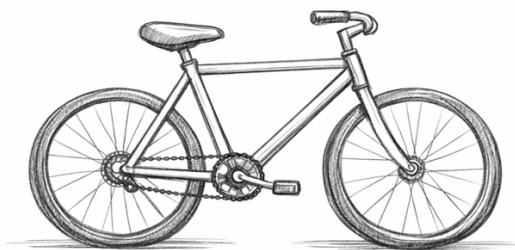

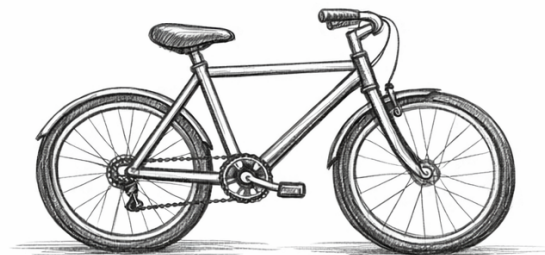

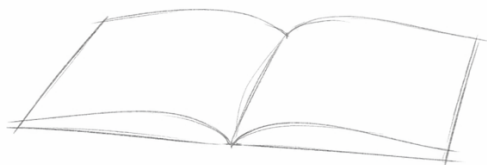
Quick Tips:

- Draw the two wheels as equal circles first
- The frame triangle connects the wheels at key points
- Add spokes after the main structure is in place
- Keep handlebars and seat proportional

14. Open Book

Everyday object — practice perspective, curves, and line work

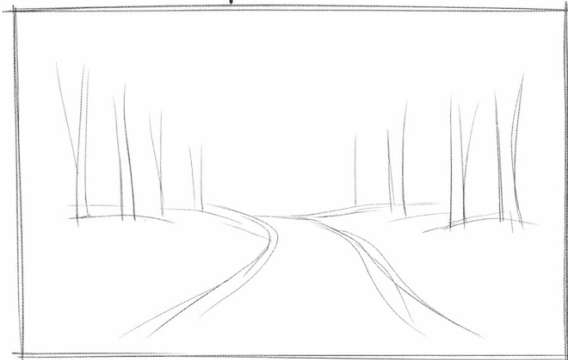
Quick Tips:

- Start with two rectangles for the open pages
- The spine curve is key to making it look open and natural
- Use curved lines for text to follow the page shape
- Add a bookmark for extra detail and visual interest

15. Forest Path Landscape

Intermediate landscape — combines trees, depth, and atmosphere

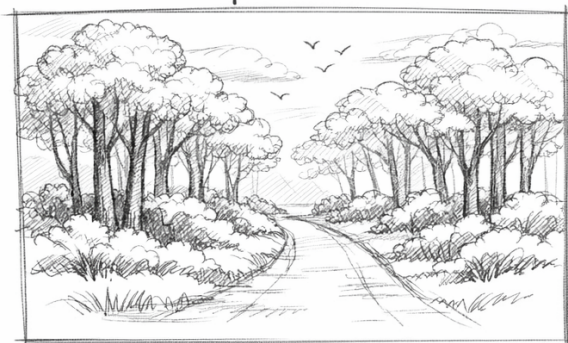

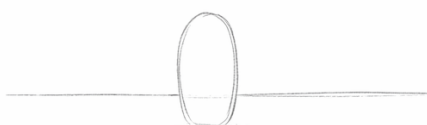
Quick Tips:

- Start with the path to establish perspective
- Trees should get smaller as they recede into the distance
- Add layers of foliage for depth
- Use shading to create a sense of light filtering through trees

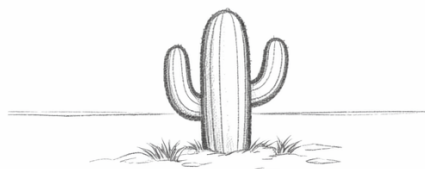
16. Desert Landscape

New landscape type — practice horizon lines, texture, and minimalism

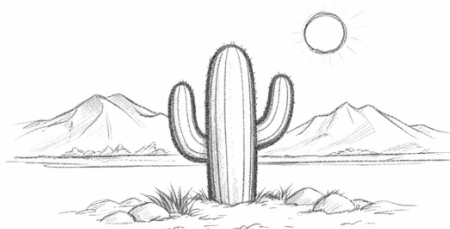

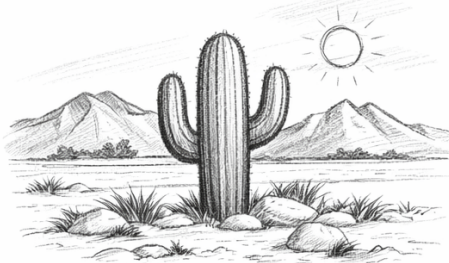

Quick Tips:

- Establish the horizon line early — it anchors the scene
- Cactus shapes are simple ovals with curved arms
- Use short, varied lines for ground texture (sand, rocks)
- Keep distant mountains light and simple for depth

General Sketching Tips

Essential advice for beginner to intermediate sketchers

Tools You'll Need:

- **Pencils:** HB for sketching, 2B for shading, 4B for dark areas
- **Eraser:** A kneaded eraser for lifting graphite without damaging paper
- **Paper:** Sketch paper (100–150 gsm) or a sketchbook
- **Blending tool:** Tortillon or clean tissue for smooth shading

Fundamental Techniques:

- **Start light:** Always begin with light, loose lines you can adjust
- **Use simple shapes:** Break complex objects into circles, squares, and triangles
- **Observe proportions:** Compare sizes and distances between elements
- **Shading:** Use hatching (parallel lines) and cross-hatching for texture and depth
- **Practice regularly:** Even 15 minutes a day will improve your skills significantly

Common Mistakes to Avoid:

- Pressing too hard too soon — keep initial lines light
- Skipping the basic shapes step — they're your foundation
- Forgetting to leave highlights — they bring drawings to life
- Not stepping back to check proportions regularly
- Rushing the shading — take your time for smooth gradients
